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CHAIR'S WELCOME

DEAR FRIENDS,

At a time when our democracy faces growing threats, Australian Progress is an antidote to citizen disengagement and an enabling force for leaders of courage on the big challenges facing our future.

Of real note this year is the launch of our significant partnership with ACOSS to launch Progress Labs, a unique program that helps new start-up nonprofits giving voice and support to under-represented communities.

The fact that this program received more than 100 applicants for its inaugural cohort of seven demonstrates the pent-up demand for social leaders for support, and opportunity for innovation in the nonprofit sector. I'm thrilled that with our support these projects raised matching seed funds of more than \$500,000. I can't wait to see the ripple effects they have in communities and on national policy. We thank DonkeyWheel Trust and Vasudhara Foundation for their underpinning support for this work.

Thanks to the leadership of Philanthropy Australia and others, we've seen tremendous growth in appetite within the philanthropic community for advocacy and capacity-building enabling systemic change. We've played our own part in this effort, including hosting Sara El-amine from the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative in Melbourne for a powerful series of presentations, including at the Nexus conference.

Our training programs continued at pace - with dynamic new cohorts graduating from our Progress Fellowship in Sydney and Melbourne and dozens taking part in short courses. It was wonderful to see 300 digital campaigners and community organisers come together

Sydney in November.

Despite not running our major conference this year, and significant investments associated with starting a new program in the Labs, we saw pleasing continued revenue growth and activity.

We owe a huge debt of gratitude to our Inner Circle members - ACF, ActionAid, CPSU, Oxfam Australia, and NUW Victoria - for their ongoing support, both financial and in our programs and activities. And at the end of the year we received a significant grant from Equity Trustees, who join our friends at the Reichstein Foundation as pivotal partners.

I want to particularly thank the staff team for their tireless efforts, and acknowledge Deputy Director Rebecca Wilson who recently took up an exciting new role in the United States. Over four years, Rebecca contributed immeasurably to our approach and impact - and will be greatly missed by our community. Not missing a beat however, we welcome a dynamic trio of new staff. Kirsty Albion, Matt Jowett and Phong Trinh joined Nick Moraitis and Elise Dalley in our Melbourne office.

Finally, I thank the board for their collegiate and considered contribution - especially outgoing board members Victoria Keesing, Anita Tang and Miriam Lyons, whose wisdom and experience have guided the organisation since (or close to) its founding.

Two new cohorts of Progress Fellows graduated in Melbourne and Sydney - joining a powerful new community, and gaining skills in strategy, media, digital and organising.



FELLOWSHIP ALUMNI

Fellows from across the country journeyed to the third annual Fellowship Alumni Retreat in the stunning Blue Mountains to share skills and strategise. We also ran half a dozen catch-up events across the country.



ECONOMIC MESSAGING PROJECT

During the Fellowship, participants gain best-practice skills in strategy, digital engagement, grassroots organising, direct advocacy with decision-makers, mainstream media skills, and more. This year, the Melbourne Fellowship was facilitated by Nick Moraitis, and the Sydney Fellowship was facilitated by Anita Tang.

SARA EL-AMINE VISIT

Australian Progress hosted Sara El-amine, Director of Advocacy at the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative for a visit to Melbourne in March.

Sara is working at the cutting edge of philanthropic investment in advocacy, and was formerly Executive Director of President Barack Obama's Organising for America movement. During her visit, Sara was keynote speaker at the Nexus Australia conference.

Sara provided lessons and advice at two special private events we organised in collaboration with the Reichstein Foundation attended



by 30 major philanthropists (with thanks to Arnold Bloch Leibler), and 30 non-profit leaders.

ECONOMIC MESSAGING PROJECT



This year, Australian Progress released groundbreaking new research on how Australians reason about the economy.

Developed together with eight diverse civil society partners, the project explored tax, welfare, aid, privatisation, work and more.

The results were published in a detailed Messaging Guide, as well as a very popular "Ready Reckoner" - with clear guidance on how to craft messaging that makes a compelling case for partners' policies with persuadable audiences.

We launched the Guide with briefings attended by more than 500 people in Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne, and rolled out a series of internal workshops at partner groups.

Our recommendations were based on research commissioned by Australian Progress and conducted by Bluestone Research, Reveille Strategy, and QDOS Research. This included focus groups across the country and a quantitative survey and dial-test with a representative sample of 1,500 Australians.



BALANCE SHEET

Australian Progress continues to grow in line with our business plan. We significantly grew our partnerships with the philanthropic sector, both for our core operations, and for our Progress Labs collaboration with ACOSS.

Revenue from event attendance and sponsorship was lower as it was a rest year for our Progress and Leadership conferences. Some areas of our work are delivered in close partnership with other organisations who control the budget, and are therefore not reflected in our own financials - such as the Progress Central space, operated in partnership with Ethical Property.
