FROM THE CHAIR

Dear friends,

This has been a huge year for the powerful Australian Progress community, and the organisation which supports it.

Community leaders convened just three years ago to discuss the creation of shared capacity-building infrastructure that could help everyone's work—and it's fair to say our FY2016 results begin to represent what we had in mind.

In 2012, we noted just how siloed our civil society had become, with organisations and campaigners focused narrowly on single issues, without a systemic analysis. So it was tremendously rewarding to attend Leadership 2016, our new flagship event for senior non-profit leaders, and see both big-picture thinking, and a real desire to work more in coalition.

In 2012, we bemoaned the lack of professional development opportunities for skilled campaigners. This year alone, more than 100 graduates joined our Fellowship - and we expanded beyond Melbourne and Sydney with cohorts in Queensland, Western Australia, and New Zealand. Additionally, we trained dozens of new tech-savvy campaigners through Digital Bootcamp and added new trainings in community organising, media interview skills and more.

In 2012, we were worried too many causes were focused on the inside-game, speaking to the already converted, and without the language and communications frames to win mainstream support. This year, we were thrilled to see 160 passionate community organisers converge at Organise 2016 with laser-like focus on building beyond their base. And with our simply amazing Expert in Residence, Anat Shenker Osorio, we worked on nearly a dozen issue-areas to help craft new resonate messaging.

All of this work has been driven by our community with the support of our nimble and impressive staff team - Nick Moraitis, Rebecca Wilson, Paige Burton and Jessica Kirby. I also particularly want to thank our Inner Circle members, ActionAid, CPSU, GetUp, NUW (Victoria), and Oxfam Australia for their vital leadership and financial support.

Thanks are also due to our hardworking and diligent board of directors, particularly retiring members Simon Every and Madeleine McClelland.

If we are to sustain this level of activity and impact, we also need to grow our own capacity and be clear-eyed about priorities. To this end, in June we were thrilled to launch our ambitious new business plan for the next decade, developed in close collaboration with stakeholders. I look forward to working with our board, staff and all friends to make it a reality.

Anat and a small team of researchers conducted more than 50 interviews, 12 focus groups, and an Australian first large-scale dial-test, ultimately producing new language that would reach and persuade middle Australia.

SHAPING A NEW STORY

In March, we convened a groundbreaking working conference for campaigners seeking to shift the narrative around people seeking asylum.

Shaping a New Story reviewed Anat Shenker-Osorio's recommendations, explored good communications practices, and provided space to develop new campaign collaborations. Our co-hosts played key roles in designing and delivering the event - it was great to work with the Refugee Council of Australia, GetUp, Amnesty International Australia, Refugee Advice and Casework, Impact International Group, the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre, and Andrew Kaldor AM.

Thanks to the Australian Human Rights Commission for providing the venue for the conference, and to Proffesor Gillian Triggs for making opening remarks.

INCUBATION REVIEW

In our early years, Australian Progress experimentally supported a variety of new start-up campaigning organisations whether by convening initial coalitions of support, providing legal and operational infrastructure, or providing direct start-up funds.

In 2015, we conducted an evaluation of this work, with a focus on ways we could learn from our own experience and global best practice, to strengthen our incubation process moving forward.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?



The Parenthood has grown to a community of tens of thousands of mums and dads and helped secure victories on a national vaccination package, kindy and preschool funding and the GP co-payment.



Fair Agenda kept a national spotlight on the dangerous under-funding of family violence services, and helped win \$4 million for 1800 RESPECT.



Solar Citizens won victory after victory for solar owners with State Governments and big energy companies. For example, thousands of petition signatures forced WA Premier Barnett to back down on a solar tax.



Common Grace became a movement of over 20,000 Christians supporting causes like the Church Sanctuary movement, the People's Climate March, and Pokies reform.

NEW BUSINESS PLAN

Australian Progress has adopted a new 10 year business plan.

Over the decade, we will continue our work to strengthen the voice of civil society organisations.

Under our new plan, we will grow our small staff team from 4 to 7 by 2019, and 11 by 2021. We will increase our budget to \$1.67M by 2019 and \$2.5M by 2021. We look forward to working with all stakeholders to make the plan a reality.

We will have worked intensively with 1,500 campaigners, typically from existing organisations, to strengthen their skills and networks.

Community

We will have built a network of 10,000 campaigners who share information and collaborate.

Capacity

We will have played a key role role establishing 40 social movement organisations, filling gaps and driving innovation.

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FINANCIAL SUMMARY

During the year, Australian Progress achieved strong financial results reflecting a maturing business model, growing activities, and increased philanthropic support.

We achieved an overall increase in event and training income, even though our major Progress conference was not held during the year. This result was achieved primarily through an expansion in our Fellowship program. We received valuable new support from philanthropic foundations, a revenue stream we expect will grow further in future.

Over the year we saw an unanticipated decline in income from our Inner Circle partner organisations, which impacted on our bottom line. With new Inner Circle members and increased commitments from existing partners, we expect this income line to rebound in FY2017. As our Incubation program was paused during the year for an internal review, there was no income or expenditure in that program.
